Helping Hands Gets a Helping Hand

Amber Brocke and her fiancée, Curt Cady, have been busy constructing a shelter for the animals she rescues and fosters through Helping Hands. They have been using recycled wood from the 100-year-old house that stood on the site and a 50-year-old barn that fell down.

Helping Hands is a non-profit organization made up of volunteers who foster rescued pets. Many pets are abandoned and unfortunately, many are abused. Amber and Curt foster predominately cats and dogs; however, they have also rescued horses and other animals in the past.

In 2022, Helping Hands rescued and found homes for 231 dogs and 413 cats. That's a lot of animals! They are funded solely from donations from the community. 97% of the funds that they receive are used for vet services and emergencies, to spay and neuter the pets, and food for the pets that come into their care.

Boaz and Erin Davis of the Juliaetta area have been active participants as well as many other pet lovers.

A Social Worker's Support

My name is Samantha Roberts, and I am a senior at Kendrick High School. For my senior project, I researched social work and how a social worker can help support the community. Having social workers in the community allows us the benefits of system resources like counseling and support groups.

During my project, I met with Mrs. Dionne Marek and asked her 20 interview questions that ranged from "How can a teenager be more involved and impactful in our community?" to "How can I show kids that are struggling with issues in life that there are more people to reach out to than just trusted adults or teachers?" One particular question I asked Mrs. Marek was, "Do you think there are quite a few kids struggling with issues in life in this community?" and Mrs. Marek responded with "Yes, especially because there are not a lot of resources available in rural communities like this to better families and individuals." This started me on the idea of something involving the youth in this community; I want to provide a safe platform and someone for kids to reach out to, like a youth group. I then asked Mrs. Marek, "Do you think community events led by teenagers can influence kids struggling with issues in life to see that there are more people to reach out to than just teachers and adults?" Mrs. Marek discussed something I hadn't yet heard of and something valuable for my future profession which was "youth impacting youth." This can be so important because kids often relate better, and feel more comfortable, with someone closer in age. As a future social worker and psychologist, I want to get an early start working with kids that have struggles in life, those that might need someone to talk to but don't have the resources because of personal reasons (i.e transportation, financial issues or beliefs).

There are a couple support groups in our area! One is a youth group at the Juliaetta Church of the Nazarene on Sunday evenings at 6pm and the other is a support group/bible study, open to anyone of any age, at the Kendrick United Methodist Church on Tuesday nights. The leader in Kendrick, Jasmine Lawson says "It's a place where you can come as you are and will be loved. There is no judgment." I would like to help these resources be utilized by the community to give our youth, and others, a helpful place to feel supported.



Be Safe

Heating, holiday decorations, winter storms and candles used during winter months all contribute to an increased risk of fire. Blow out lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed. More than one third of home decoration fires are started by candles.



*There are approximately 45,000 home electrical fires each year.

*Peak months for electrical fire deaths are November through March.

*Plug only 1 heat-producing appliance (like a coffee maker, space heater, or microwave) directly into a wall outlet at a time.

*Never use an extension cord with a heat-producing appliance.

*Have an electrician install additional wall outlets where you need them.

*Do not plug heaters into a power strip.

What will I recommend this time around to those of you who share my passion for recreational reading? Well, let’s start with **Where the Crawdad’s Sing** by Della Owens. It is a heartbreaking coming of age novel about a young, abandoned girl, Kya, who manages to survive on her own in a marsh. It is a beautifully written book that follows her life right up to being on trial for murder. A fascinating read with a twist in the plot you will not expect.

Secondly, I enjoyed **The Saints of Swallow Hill** by Donna Everhart. This book is a real page turner as you are transported inside the Depression-era labor camps in the pine forests of the south. Experience the lives of three vagabonds, whose lives intertwine in the turpentine camps. A wonderful read.

I love reading historical fiction (you may have noticed.) The third book I will recommend is a World War II story that centers around the life of a Jewish youth, Felix, and Inge, the girl he loves. Inge is from an upper-class family who has betrothed her to a high-ranking Nazi soldier ten years older than her. Felix and Inge meet briefly and fall in love. This fascinating story takes you inside the Nazi death camps. **The Fortunate Ones** by Catherine Hoken is definitely worth reading.

I started reading a trilogy by Anne M. McLoughlin. The first book, **Lives Apart** is an Irish family saga. The family immigrated to Boston, San Francisco, and Nova Scotia after the potato famine. The second book, **Lives Without End**, explores the next generation of the family. They are both stories of courage amidst adversity and a family dealing with family secrets.

And then Anne McLoughlin let me down. The third book was supposed to be released in 2022 and is not out yet. Perhaps by the time you read it, all three will be in place. *Sharon Harris*

Turkey Vultures

All vultures are large birds. The turkey vulture has a wingspan of 63–72", a length of 24–32" and weighs from 2 to almost 5.5 lbs. Feathers are black with a brownish cast. The head has no feathers, and the red skin resembles that of a male turkey, hence the name "Turkey" vulture.

They are sighted most often as they soar on wind currents. They frequent open country where thermal drafts allow them to glide effortlessly. The flight pattern is wobbly circles and the wings, when seen head on, are held in a shallow "V". The feathers of the wing-tips spread apart slightly to resemble "fingers."

Vultures are the avian equivalent of garbage trucks. They feed upon carrion, from small to large mammals and even fish and animal dung. This performs a valuable service by reducing carrion which would otherwise be a breeding ground for germs and infectious diseases. Vultures (often called "buzzards") locate their meals by the odor. Their brains have unusually large olfactory lobes that are responsible for processing smells. These birds are drawn to the odor of ethyl mercaptan, a gas produced by the beginnings of decay in dead animals. Their keen sense of smell allows them to find carrion beneath forest canopies and other hidden locations. They want fresh carcasses and will avoid meat that has reached advanced putrefaction.

Turkey vultures roost in large community groups, often in dead or sparsely-leaved trees. In the daytime, they forage individually or in small groups.

These birds have a number of interesting, if disgusting, habits. When the weather is hot, they will defecate on their feet and legs. The evaporating liquid cools them and the white uric acid reflects heat. The stomach contents are extremely acidic allowing them to digest almost anything, even carcasses tainted with tuberculosis and rabies, without becoming ill. When threatened, they can projectile vomit a LONG distance, up to 10 feet! No wonder other creatures keep their distance!

Even youngsters have the skill of projectile vomiting, in addition to voicing threatening hisses. And speaking of youngsters, vulture pairs build no nests. They lay their eggs on bare ground, but generally in inaccessible places, like caves or high mountain crags.

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
