

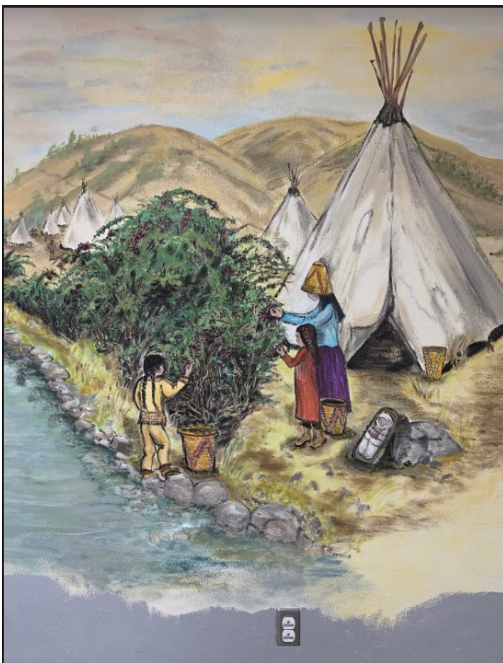

“Leaders of the Past” Mural at Juliaetta Elementary

There are many stories and experiences that come from the past in the development of the Juliaetta and Kendrick area. In an effort to bring our history to life for students at Juliaetta Elementary School, a grant was written and received from the Nez Perce Tribe Local Education Program Fund to create a mural in the cafeteria. This article is the first of ten that will be published in our newsletter to introduce the new mural to the community.



The painting was created by Diane Garot, of Pierce, Idaho, a professional painter. The historical information that is captured in this mural has been taken from the brochures, books, and information gathered by Diane, as well as information from the Castle Museum with the wonderful assistance of Justin Cope and the Kendrick Museum with the same expertise of Sharon Harris. After much discussion with townspeople, Dorie Nelsen, and Angie Cannon at Juliaetta Elementary School, Diane decided to select a few highlights from the past that students would enjoy learning about and promote pride in the history of their towns.

Scene #1 - The Nez Perce Indian Children

The first people that lived in the area where the Juliaetta Elementary School is today were the Nez Perce. They came in the spring and stayed through the beginning of the fall. They traveled with all their belongings loaded on goats. They came to this area because of the availability of animals for food as well as the berries and other fruits that they used for food and making dyes and paints. Here is a scene of some children and their mother picking the blackberries that were so abundant. The baskets were made by the Nez Perce people and each had a specific design that was indicative of their tribe. If you notice some of the baskets had a double use...as hats.

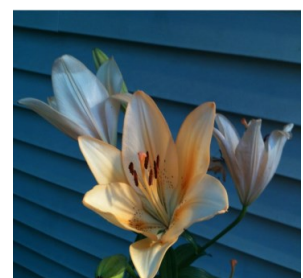

Hydrant Flushing Scheduled

City personnel will flush Juliaetta fire hydrants on Wednesday, March 15. Be aware the flushing may stir up sediment in water lines. Run a faucet in your house or outside for a few minutes and the discoloration should subside.

Clean Up Month Coming Soon!

April 1 and April 15 are clean up days at the Juliaetta bulky waste site. On these two Saturdays, only household waste will be accepted. No demolition, metal, or tires will be accepted during clean up month. E-waste, hazardous waste, and liquid waste are also not accepted. As a reminder, the Transfer Station is a bulky waste site on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month; all extremely large loads should be taken to the Transfer Station. Also, on the second and fourth Saturdays, demolition materials, metal, and tires will be accepted at the Transfer Station, even during clean up month.


Latah County Shred Day will be held Saturday, April 22 at the Latah County Fairgrounds in Moscow, 9:00 am-3:00 pm.

City of Kendrick News

Kendrick residents at the December Council meeting *City of Kendrick Resolution 17-005* to raise the city sewer rates was passed and beginning January 1, 2023, the first increase of \$3.33 will be applied to your utility bill going from \$43.05 to \$46.38.

The current sewer rate of \$43.05 was raised to accommodate our repayment loan agreement for the Bond Levy that Kendrick voters passed in May of 2020.

First Increase \$3.33 \$46.38

Second Increase \$3.33 \$49.71

Third Increase \$3.34 \$53.05



Siren System: The town siren system has been quiet for a while and is currently being upgraded by KME Specialties. The siren was installed in the sixties and needed modernization for it to function properly. Other than the noon whistle, the siren only rings if there is an evacuation necessary, which is one continuous siren blast and three siren blasts consecutively; this signal notifies the Fire department members in case the phone text dispatch system or radios are not working for our volunteers.

As spring arrives, so too do the Lenten and Easter seasons on the church calendar. This means that many traditions are taking place. One custom is the collection of care kits to be sent to those in need around the world. The ladies of the church are gathering items to assemble these kits. The kits include one dark-colored lightweight bath-sized towel, two bath-sized bars of soap, one adult-sized toothbrush in its original packaging, one sturdy comb with packaging removed, and one metal nail clippers also with packaging removed. Other gifts being assembled include baby and fabric kits.

The Lenten and Easter seasons also offer the opportunity to expand upon our normal worship schedule. Plans are in the works to add spring bulbs and summer color spots to the War Memorial Pool plantings that were started last year. We are tentatively looking at a red, white and blue theme for the summer flowers to compliment the historical aspect of the pool. The HVGC tends and plants several gardens in the Kendrick / Juliaetta area including the Butterfly Garden and Pink Garden in Juliaetta (thank you Polly Taylor-Dennler and Dorothy Taylor), the War Memorial plantings, Wallace Park and welcome sign on the north end of town, and Native Plant Garden near the RV dump site.

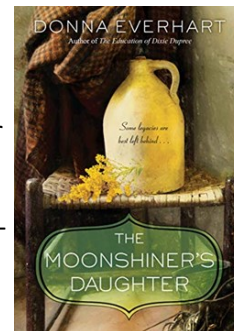

The Book Nook

"A reader lives a thousand lives before he dies. The man who never reads, lives only one." George RR Martin.

I ran across this quote, and it is so true. I went on a binge reading Donna Everhart books this last couple of months. She writes well and will keep you turning pages. She is an excellent storyteller.

The first is ***The Moonshiner's Daughter***. It is the story of a buxom teenage girl and her younger brother growing up without their mother. It is set in North Carolina's Wilkes County during prohibition. Her father's family had always been boot-leggers, but she is not so sure it is the thing to do. A fascinating story.



The second is ***The Road to Bittersweet***. We journey into the Appalachian Mountains to experience the hardships of a family torn apart by a flood disaster in the 1940s. Share their joys and deep sorrows as they struggle to make a life on their farm when everything has been washed away. It is a good story of one family's struggle to survive amidst unimaginable hardship.

The third Donna Everhart book I read is ***The Forgiving Kind*** which takes place in the 1950s deep south on a cotton farm. When the farm family loses their father and husband, a rich, reclusive neighbor offers his assistance. The family is thrown headlong into an evil scheme that brings with it violence, heartbreak, and finally justice. Their family values are tested to the limit in an environment where the KKK still rules.

The Dry Grass of August by Anna Jean Mayhew is another well-written novel about segregation in the deep south. The members of the Watts family love their black maid and nanny, whose name is Mary. It takes place in 1954 with a young girl questioning why the color of the skin makes a difference. This novel gives you a firsthand look at the work of the KKK.

(Gosh, I guess I have been in the deep south for the last couple of months.) ***The Threshing of Straw*** by Kim Catron takes you into the life of a black family in the deep south in 1962. It is a story of secrets kept by a grandmother, a mother, and the community. Young Macy May Johnson is only nine years old, but she despises racism, and the damage secrets can cause.

In this issue, we are featuring a published local photographer, Jenna Watkins, who owns FIELD + FERN Photography Co. Jenna specializes in, but is not limited to, couples, weddings and elopement photography. How did you get started, or what inspired you to become a photographer?

"I actually began this journey working as a journalistic photographer. When my passion began to trickle into my personal life and photographing friends and family grew beyond a hobby, I decided to make it a business. In 2021, after working as a photographer part-time on the weekends, I left my job at State Farm to go full time."

What sets you apart from other businesses in your field?

"My style of photography is very Pacific Northwest Themed. Moody greens, dramatic landscapes & soulful images. I have a healthy combination of posing my clients while also, in a documentary fashion, capturing them as they are."

How has being a small business changed your life?

Build It and They Will Come...

Kendrick High School's Ag Teacher, Matt Ross, has a dream that is coming to fruition in 2023. It will provide training, education, and skills to local youth and buying opportunities for local gardeners.

The name of the project is simply "The Greenhouse," a 30 x 96 (2,880 sq ft.) building, that has been designed and will be constructed by 15 of the students in the Ag Program, under the direction of Mr. Ross. The greenhouse will be located on the old tennis courts, just behind the building that the Ag Department has currently outgrown.

In October of 2022, Matt and his sons drove to Columbia Falls, Montana, to disassemble the acquired greenhouse, a task that took a weekend with the help of some locals, to have transported back to Kendrick by Jack Buell Trucking out of St. Maries, ID.

Students have been busy this school year developing a working model of the greenhouse as well as in labs to determine which kind of concrete formula will best fit the long term needs of the building. They are eager to lay forms and pour the concrete once the weather warms up.

The Greenhouse will be a multipurpose building and the largest of its kind in our area. Part of the space will be used to propagate and breed plants, while another portion will be set aside for student/community education.

The building is not zoned for retail sales; however, there will be a space allocated outside the structure for students to sell plants, which will include the wildly popular floral baskets between the months of May and June. The plan is to increase the number of baskets next year to between 200-300. They will be available for sale on a first-come, first-served basis. The baskets will include some mixed shade options, adding perennials as well.

Funding for The Green House has been provided by a designated greenhouse account (10K) and by the school district (12K). Donations to finish project details are still being gratefully accepted. In addition, the students need more containers (especially 1 gallon size) for planting, which can be dropped by the outside door of the Ag building anytime. *Sherill Calhoon*

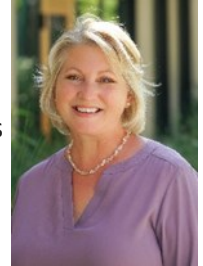

Shopping Local Ensures Food Security in Tough Times

The US has been putting all of its eggs in one basket for a long time, but that's proving to be a poor strategy to ensuring our nation's food security.

On January 29, 2023 the third largest egg producing operation in the country burned to the ground, representing yet another tragic disruption to the mass food production model in the US. More than twenty similar facilities burned in 2022, according to reports.

With egg prices at the grocery store already sky high following an outbreak of bird flu in 2022, the loss of this mass market producer is sure to further inflate prices of eggs for the retail shopper. Enter the rural small farm as the hero in this tale of resiliency.

Even before this latest egg factory met its end, poultry owners large and small here on the Palouse had already started responding to the community's increased need for eggs. New ads for duck and chicken eggs have cropped up everywhere, offering to fill the needs of the market with local farm-fresh eggs.

These days it's not uncommon to find eggs being sold at the grocery store for more than \$7 per dozen, but shoppers can still find and purchase healthier local, farm-fresh eggs for around \$4 or \$5 a dozen, and the money stays here in the community.

Local producers coming to the rescue of the mass market food production model is nothing new in this area. On our small farm in Deary, we produce pastured pork and grass-fed beef which we primarily sell at the local farmers markets. But in 2020, when COVID-related shutdowns elsewhere in the country affected food supplies at grocery stores here in Idaho, our family made hundreds of deliveries of our farm-raised meat and eggs to Moscow residents and surrounding communities whose access to basic resources were suddenly restricted due to lockdowns or supply chain disruptions.

We weren't the only farm doing it. Dozens of rural Idaho producers were able to meet the demand of the community straight from their farms and gardens. As a result, Idaho small farmers, producers and business here on the Palouse flourished during the pandemic, as the mass food production model showed its weakness.

As worldwide economic conditions remain uncertain, and the US continues to be impacted by the loss of mass market food production plants, Idaho is uniquely positioned for food resiliency. In addition to our robust existing agricultural resources, Idaho has recently attracted an influx of new landowners who are trying their hand at farming and food production. This growing number of rural small farms and independent food producers will surely serve to bolster our sustainable food resources by bringing more diversity and fresh perspectives to our community, which should ensure continued local and regional economic resiliency, regardless of conditions elsewhere.

Supporting local producers, new and old, even when national supply chains are stable promises a bright future for our own local economic resilience, as well as for the quality of food available here on the Palouse. *Erika Sattler*

Erika Sattler is the owner of Texas Ridge LLC, selling pastured pork, grass fed beef and non-GMO livestock feed produced by her family's regenerative farm in Deary, Idaho. Erika also started the Latah Farmers Market in 2021, which now has two farmers market locations to serve customers, one in Troy and one in Potlatch. These markets are operated independent of municipal governments, and only exist for the purpose of improving access to local food and products raised on small farms in Latah County.

House Finches

House Finches are small birds with fairly large beaks and somewhat flattened heads. Adult males are rosy red around the face and breast with streaky brown backs, bellies and tails. In flight, the red rump is conspicuous. Adult females are plain grayish-brown with thick, blurry streaks and indistinctly marked faces. The birds are roughly the size of house sparrows, but more slender.

If your goal is an introduction to house finches, a seed-filled bird feeder is your best bet. Find a pair of binoculars and a comfortable seat, because a popular feeder location will draw a range of small finch-sized birds in constant motion. You may see pine siskins, juncos, chickadees, and one or more kinds of finches including goldfinches. There are 3 finches with rosy heads that are easily confused. Cassin's Finch has the brightest red color. The crown of its head has feathers that appear to need being combed down. The red fades to a white underneath. The purple finch is slightly chunkier with heavier head and neck and the color tends to an old rose tone. Purple finches are rare in our part of Idaho. It takes careful observation to be sure which finch you see. In our area, when in doubt, it's safest to claim, "It's probably a house finch!"

To further complicate things, male house finch color may not be red at all, but orange or even yellow. The color is determined by compounds in their diet, the same ones that provide color in carrots and tomatoes. Females prefer the mates with the biggest, brightest red patches – indicators of a well-fed male.

House finches are well adapted to dry climates, but they still need water which may be obtained from vegetation. These small birds can consume their body weight in fluids daily. Bird feeders with nearby birdbaths are powerful attractions.

Western house finches tend to build nests within 60 feet of the previous season's nest location. Sites are variable: tall trees, planters, streetlights, windowsills. The important features are a sturdy base and overhead protection from rain and sun.

House finches are strictly vegetarian, eating seeds, buds, leaves and fruit. Only when hatchlings are very young, may parents offer some protein in the form of fly larvae.

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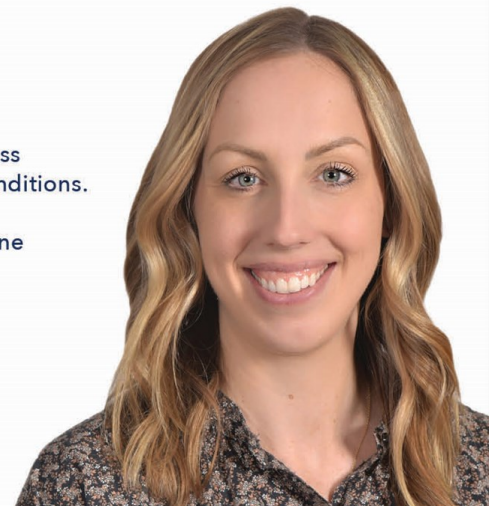
