News from the City of Juliaetta

Election 2023

Two four-year Council positions and the four-year Mayor position are up for election this November 7. These positions are currently held by Vickie Jo Witt, Wendi Dodge, and Richard Groseclose, respectively. Those interested in running for office may submit their Declarations of Candidacy and either a Petition of Candidacy or a \$40 filing fee, August 28 through September 8. Candidates must be at least eighteen years of age, a US citizen, a registered voter, and their primary residence must be within the city. For more information and to pick up filing forms, visit City Hall.

Burn Permits

Until further notice, no burn permits will be issued in city limits. This ban will likely remain in place until October.

Clean Up Month

October 7 and 21 will be clean up days at the Juliaetta Bulky Waste Site. Bring your plastic and rubber items, glass, old paint, small appliances, dishwashers, microwaves, railroad ties, tents, tarps/canvas, hot tubs, insulation, styrofoam, VCRs, and stereos. No hazardous or asbestos waste, and no computer monitors or TVs will be accepted. The bulky waste sites will not accept demolition waste in October, but we will try to have a yard waste bin available. All large loads must be taken to the Transfer Station.

Increased Sewer Rates

At the August City Council meeting, Council discussed with the wastewater engineer the need to gradually increase sewer rates in order to support both the operation and maintenance of the wastewater system, as well as to pay back any loans taken to construct upgrades at the wastewater treatment plant. Council voted to increase sewer rates by \$4.50 every six months beginning October 1. A public hearing regarding these increased rates will be held on September 12, and a proposed Fee and Rate Resolution will be presented for approval at the following meeting.

City Council Meetings and Closures

Upcoming regular City Council meetings will be held on Tuesday, September 12, 2023 and Tuesday, October 10. These meetings begin at 7:00 pm. Agendas are posted in the window at City Hall the week before each meeting, as well as at cityofjuliaetta.com. The public is always welcome to attend. If you have an issue you would like to have added to the agenda, you must contact City Hall by noon the Wednesday before the meeting.

City Hall will be closed Monday, September 4 for Labor Day, and Monday, October 9 for Indigenous Peoples' Day/Columbus Day. *Wendy Sandino*

On July 18th prior to our Council meeting, we had Sheriff Richie Skiles, Tim Besst and Officer Anderson in attendance for a meeting with the citizens. Guest Darrell Keim Director of the Latah Recovery Center was there as well to answer questions.

No roosters allowed in Kendrick. Chickens are allowed in Kendrick with a permit purchased at City Hall. Code 10-3-1. There will be no keeping or maintaining of roosters, and you are only allowed to have 6 hens. If you do not have a permit or if have a rooster, please abide by the rules. *Rose Norris*



New Garbage Collection Company Will Service Juliaetta and Kendrick Beginning in October

The Latah County Commissioners, after hearing the recommendations of county staff and the rural cities, recently awarded Sunshine Disposal & Recycling the Solid Waste Collection contract to begin on **October 1, 2023**.

These are some frequently-asked questions for rural City and Latah County residents:

Q: Will the commercial steel dumpsters in use be changed?

A: Yes, all commercial steel dumpsters will be exchanged for a front load mechanical system of collection. The container currently being serviced will be replaced by the same size container.

Q: Will the collection day or time change?

A: The service day for collection will not change. All carts and dumpsters will need to be out for service by 6:30 am on the current scheduled service day. If the service day needs to be changed for your address, you will be contacted by Sunshine Disposal & Recycling.

Q: Do I need to place my cart in a different location for service?

A: If the cart needs to be serviced in a different location the driver will place the cart where it needs to be for weekly service or place a tag on your cart with notification to avoid any interruptions of service. All carts will be serviced with a mechanical arm and must be turned with the lid opening toward the roadway (handles toward the residence).

Q: Who do I contact to resolve service issues, request a cart exchange, or a change of service?

A: Contact Sunshine Disposal & Recycling at (208)743-4075 to resolve service issues, exchange of cart or additional cart needed, or for a dumpster service. You will be billed for the change of service by your city or Latah County Solid Waste.

Q: Who will I receive a bill from?

A: There will be no changes to the current billing for the customers. Latah County Solid Waste will bill all rural customers. Customers within city limits will be billed by the city the service address is within.

Q: Will there be a fee for extra bags?

A: All customers with overflowing carts or dumpsters will be billed for the extra bag(s) or yard(s) collected.

Q: Will there be any changes to the Latah County Bulky Waste Program?

A: No changes will be made to the Latah County Bulky Waste Program. The rural cities sites will only accept HOUSEHOLD WASTE on the scheduled Saturdays in April and October. HOUSEHOLD WASTE includes all plastic, rubber items, glass, old solidified paint, small appliances, dishwashers, microwaves, railroad ties, tents, tarps/canvas, hot tub insulation, Styrofoam, VCRs, printers, stereos, and contaminated waste. Bulky Waste Service Dates are as follows:
Juliaetta and Potlatch—1st and 3rd Saturdays of the month; Deary, Genesee, and the Transfer Station—2nd and 4th Saturdays of the month. Sites are closed on the 5th Saturday of the month, or if New Year's Day, Christmas Day, or Independence Day fall on a Saturday.

Q: Will there be any changes to the Rural Recycling Program?

A: The existing roll off boxes will be replaced by a series of front-load containers that will be serviced on a weekly schedule. The number of front-load containers used at each location will be based on use. Each container will accept cardboard, mixed wastepaper, tin/steel and aluminum cans. The items deposited will not need to be sorted and will be accepted as comingled recyclables. **Not accepted at any time are plastics (of any type), plastic bags, Styrofoam, glass, or trash.** These items contaminate the recyclables and thus must be processed as garbage at \$97.90 per ton. The Moscow Recycling Center, located at 401 N. Jackson Street, Moscow, will accept #1 clear plastics, #2 cloudy plastics, and glass. All commercial businesses or residents with extremely large quantities of cardboard are encouraged to drop recyclables off at the Moscow Recycling Center.

Q: Will the holiday service schedule change?

A: The holiday service schedule will remain the same. Collection service will be one day late if your service day is on or after the following holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Labor Day, Independence Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. Your service day will not change for all other holidays or if the holiday is on a Saturday. When in doubt, put your cart out.

Q: Will Sunshine Disposal & Recycling hire local employees?

Water Crisis

We have a large problem at the Grange, Museum, and Garden Club. We have no water!

Since discovering that we had a leak that was losing one and one-half gallons of water every minute, we had to shut the water off. After careful scrutiny, there was no evidence of a leak.

Then began the long process of trying to obtain a plumber who could do the job. We finally found Roto Rooter who came in mid-July to do a "locate." They located the leak which was unfortunately underneath the sidewalk. The pipe had broken and was leaking directly into the drain sewer. (How convenient!) The sidewalk had to be torn up.

Upon starting the real work later in July to repair the damage, the problems started. After fixing the initial leak, another pipe burst upon turning on the water. After that, every time they replaced a segment, another one broke.

Well, you guessed it. This project is going to require a complete replacement of all the plumbing under the building and the project will cost nearly \$15,000. The sidewalk will have to be torn out in another area near the back door. The asphalt roadway will have to be torn out to accommodate a new pipeline and then replaced.

Considering the pipes are probably 100 years old, we have been lucky. However, this coming in the middle of needing a new roof as well, has quickly bankrupted the Grange. We cannot write for grants, since grants only cover projects that are planned, not completed. We are in a real pickle and must ask the community to help.

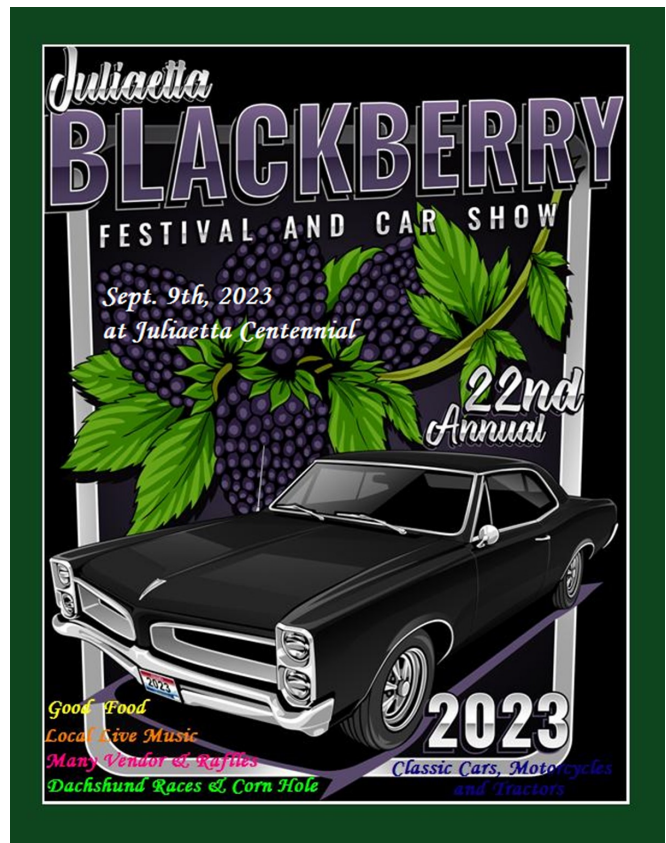

Scene #4 - The Northern Pacific Railroad arrives in Kendrick in 1891

The City of Kendrick began as a township, then it was sold and named Latah. It was re-named, Kirby, when Thomas Kirby purchased the townsite. But after the arrival of the railroad, it was again renamed. This time it would be called Kendrick, after the Chief Engineer, James W. Kendrick. The area had received permission to pass over the Nez Perce land in 1891. The land was cleared and the railroad came through.* It was recorded that President Grant was on the first run to come through. Because of the railroad, the area grew and prospered. Kendrick was a trade center. At one time, there were four trains a day. The beautiful railroad days were phased out in 1975.

Cameron Lutheran News

Even with VERY hot August days upon us it's time to start planning fall activities. At Cameron, the fall season will kick off for us - or summer will conclude, depending on how you look at it! - on Aug. 27 with our annual outdoor worship service. All are welcome to attend - check the church web-site (cameronemmanuel.org) or call the church ((208) 289-3471) for the location. The service will begin at 10:00 a.m., followed by a potluck lunch. On Sept. 3 we will go back to our regular fall schedule of Sunday School at 9:00 and worship services at 10:00.

Over the late summer months we have been gathering supplies for the Lutheran World Relief school kits. These kits contain supplies for children all over the world whose parents sometimes have to choose between sending the kids to school and providing the supplies they need (especially girls) or buying food for the family. Also, some of the items are not easily available in more remote locations. These kits supply notebooks, pencils - along with a sharpener - pens, erasers, crayons, rulers, scissors, all of which are packed in a backpack-type bag. These bags are made by the church women over the summer and are often quite colorful! The whole congregation is invited to purchase and donate items for these kits, especially during the summer school-supply sales. The generosity is wonderful - we will have enough for 50 kits this year. These will be packed and taken to Spokane for distribution in October along with quilts and baby kits assembled over the summer.

The annual turkey dinner and bazaar will be held on Saturday, October 21, at the church. Dinner will begin at 5:00 p.m. and the auction will follow about 7:00. The money raised at this event is used for charities and scholarships, as well as for operating expenses for the women's activities. The dinner features turkey - carved off real turkeys right there at the dinner! - mashed potatoes and gravy, homemade dressing, cranberries, green beans, and homemade pie for dessert. The auction will feature a large, hand-quilted quilt, along with all kinds of crafts, such as hand-embroidered pillow cases and dish-towels, Christmas and Thanksgiving decorations, homemade candy, baskets with all kinds of items - usually some with Vandal or Seahawk themes! - and a variety of other hand-made crafts. From Sharon Harris:

For the past two months I got my immersed in some excellent books written by Lee Jackson. I have been reading the *After Dunkirk* series. There are six books in this order: *After Dunkirk*, *Eagles Over Britain*, *Turning the Storm*, *The Giant Awakens*, *Riding the Tempest*, and *Driving the Tide*.

Once I started, there was no turning back. These books are a historical epic of the courage and sacrifice shown during the darkest days of World War II. They are exceptionally well researched and have a good story line following the Littlefield family from Sark Island. Sark, located in the Guernsey Islands, was the only British land occupied by the Germans during the war. It follows them and their four children who all take vital roles in defeating Adolph Hitler.

It shares behind the scenes planning between Winston Churchill and Franklin D. Roosevelt. It also gives an insider look at Stalin and our alliance with Russia during the war. It follows the war through the European theater on to North Africa, into the Pacific Islands, and on to Italy and Russia.

Scenes written about Bletchley, show how important code breaking and international spies were to the war effort.

From the invasion of France at Dunkirk to the bombing at Pearl Harbor and on to the liberation of France, this book series will keep you turning pages.

For a surprise thriller, *The Surgeon* by Leslie Wolfe will have you asking if the main character is a Trusted surgeon, a loving wife, or a murderer!

For dangerous scenarios, elite military tactics, suspense and maybe some political truths...the author Jack Carr (who is former military special forces himself) writes books that a reader just can't put down! Some favorites include *The Terminal List*, *Savage Son*, and *The Devil's Hand*.

The book titled *Ward D* by Freida Mc Fadden is written with twists & turns that will catch a reader off guard, wondering who the psycho really is during an overnight stay in a mental ward.

For a lesson on prohibition times, and a reminder of how important family is, read *The Moonshiner's Daughter* by author Donna Everhart.

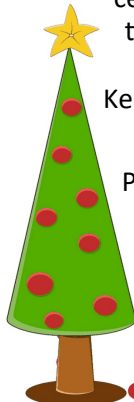

Who is the KJ7 Education Foundation? The Foundation was established in 2013 with a very generous donation from a local family Dick and Vicky Benscoter. - 1 cup butter
- 1 cup peanut butter (creamy or crunchy)
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup nuts (your choice)
- 2 - 16 oz. boxes of powdered sugar

In sauce pan over medium heat, melt cheese and butter together, then add peanut butter and stir until smooth. Remove from heat, add vanilla and nuts. Place powdered sugar in large bowl and pour cheese mixture over sugar. Stir until well blended, then knead with hands, Press into 9x2 pan. Pat with paper towel. Place in fridge until firm. Cut into squares.

Can make chocolate fudge:

Place 1/2 cup cocoa in powdered sugar, (don't put in peanut butter) 1/2 cup chocolate chips instead of peanut butter.
