#### Senior Projects Underway at Kendrick High School

Senior Projects challenge seniors to demonstrate their knowledge in an experimental way as they prepare for graduation and future careers. The State of Idaho Board of Education requires every senior to complete a project to meet graduation requirements. The Senior Project includes a series of culminating steps. After students decide on a topic, they must choose a mentor to help guide them. Students then begin to research topics and compile information into a 10+ page research paper. During the project phase, the students work to bring ideas to life by producing a tangible product, activity, or event. Next, they create portfolios, poster boards, or some visual guide to illustrate the project from start to finish. Finally, students prepare speeches and present their projects to a group of advisors and peers. Below is a summary of each project:

**Taylor Boyer**: Mentored by Rose Norris and Mr. Ross. Researching the effect that infrastructure has on equality in rural areas and its impact on future generations. Project phase included adding and renovating a women's bathroom in the Ag building at KHS. **Danyel Brown**: Mentored by Sarah Stanton. Researching how poverty has a major effect on youth in third world countries. The Project phase involved organizing a drive for toys, hygiene items, and school supplies for Operation Christmas Child.

Lane Clemenhagen: Mentored by Tim Silflow. Researching the importance and benefits of youth sports, especially in a small community. Project phase included hosting a youth football camp with fellow senior Ty Koepp and assisting the coaching staff of the JK Thunder in a youth game.

Savannah Feldman: Mentored by Kim Johnson. Researching the nursing field and its importance on a healthy and successful society. Project phase included a job shadow in a local emergency room.

**Wyatt Fitzmorris**: Mentored by Justin Luther. Researching the benefits of learning the welding trade. Project phase included welding a 3-D tiger paw for display on the new football locker room.

**Harley Heimgartner**: Mentored by Brooke Kirk. Researching the importance of colorectal cancer awareness and how it can affect younger adults. Project phase included a colorectal cancer awareness night during a volleyball match between the Kendrick Tigers and the Deary Mustangs, including a fundraiser for the Leah Swanson Open Arms Memorial Fund.

**Mason Kimberling**: Mentored by Robert Anselmo. Researching the importance of physical education and health. Project phase included the creation of a workout and demonstration for the junior high weightlifting class.

**Natalie Kimbley**: Mentored by Lleia Roberts. Researching the ways stroke survivors can live a relatively normal life after a stroke, as well as how to identify and prevent strokes by learning risk factors. Project phase was a mini basketball camp, "Hoop2Help," encouraging children to stay active through cardio exercise. All money raised was donated to the American Stroke Association for stroke-victim rehabilitation.

**Ty Koepp**: Mentored by Jessica Clemenhagen. Researching the importance and benefits of youth sports, especially in a small community. Project phase included hosting a youth football camp for our local youth with fellow senior Lane Clemenhagen. **Noah Littlefield**: Mentored by Lachelle Rosenbaum. Researching the usefulness of continuing education through learning a trade and/or attending college. The project phase included a survey that aims to help high school students decide on a path after high

school.

**Dallas Morgan**: Mentored by Matt Ross. Researching the importance of 4-H and FFA and how participation contributes to future success. Project phase included building a new-and-improved clipping shoot for steer for the KHS 4-H and FFA programs. **Kaitlynn Needham**: Mentored by Alison Thomas. Researching how to improve rural area physical therapy clinics through tele-

health. Project phase included interning over the summer at the Orofino Riverside Physical Therapy office.

**Morgan Silflow**: Mentored by Amy Kimberling. Researching obesity in America and the health risks it imposes on the future of our youth, focusing on tips to improve nutrition across the world. Project phase involved the organization of a youth nutrition class. **Ruby Stewart**: Mentored by Molly Olson. Researching the importance of physical activity on mental health, especially in young children. Project phase involved a camp for 3rd--6th graders at the JES. Camp activities included an introduction to aerobic, bone-strengthening, and muscle-strengthening exercises and a basic assessment for students.

**Hailey Taylor**: Mentored by Brenda Walker and Polly Taylor-Dennler. Researching how rural cancer patients are at a significant disadvantage compared to their urban counterparts. Project phase included re-landscaping the Pink Garden of Juliaetta to raise awareness for cancer patients and survivors, and to provide a peaceful place for people to enjoy.

Hunter Taylor: Mentored by Cody Taylor. Researching personality traits, styles of entrepreneurs, and the traits that are best for running your own business. The project phase included interviewing local business owners, focusing on the business and how personality influences success.

**Bailey Worthey**: Mentored by Mike Domaskin. Researching the controversial sides of Wreaths Across America, focusing on times in America where support for veterans declined. The project phase included coordinating a wreath laying ceremony at the Juliaetta Cemetery to promote the support of veterans within the community. *Andrea and Taylor Boyer*

#### **Recycling Bin Area**

A brush collection bin was mistakenly placed at the recycle bin area in Juliaetta. This will soon be removed. The two smaller recycling bins will remain. These are for co-mingled recycling; cardboard, paper, and metal can be deposited in both bins, and they will be emptied weekly. We have been in contact with Sunshine Disposal and are hopeful that soon the bins can be modified so it is easier to deposit aluminum cans. Please be aware that although you no longer need to sort your recyclables, ONLY METAL, CARD-BOARD, AND PAPER are allowed to be deposited. NO STYROFOAM, GARBAGE, OR PLASTIC OF ANY KIND is ever allowed in the recycling bins, including the plastic bags people may be using to carry their recyclables. Please take a few minutes, understand the rules, and make sure the recycling bins remain contaminant-free.

The city election was held on November 7. Two council seats and the position of Mayor were up for election. Richard Groseclose won in his reelection bid and will be sworn in as Mayor at the January meeting. Each of these five tribes in Idaho have their own unique culture, traditions, and government.



#### New at the Museum

We have received two new donations at the museum. Tia Pomponio donated a cobbler set including a shoe with many sizes of shoe forms and the tools of the cobbler.

Wayne Sprouse of Paradise Lodge #17 in Moscow has returned relics belonging to the Kendrick Masons for display at the museum. The Masonic Lodge of Kendrick #26 operated from 1892 to 1987, when it merged with Bovill #72 Lodge. Later, Bovill merged with Deary, and Deary merged with Genesee. Ultimately, all merged with Paradise Lodge in Moscow, which is the only lodge operating in Latah County.

The items include 5 aprons and 3 jeweled collars. Most lodges had a matching set of 12 aprons and jeweled collars for the elected and appointed officers of the lodge. You may view the three ornate blue and white aprons which belonged to the Worshipful Master, Senior War-

den, and Junior Warden. The jeweled collars have the symbols of the builders' square, level, and plumb to represent their offices.

Two white aprons were donated which once belonged to Andrew C. Cox and Judd Lee. You may view these items at the museum.

#### SIRENS & LIGHTS

To protect the safety of our volunteers please give us the right of way when we are approaching your vehicle on the highway or a street. Follow these helpful tips to protect the lives of the people who serve our community. Please move over every time they may be on the way to save the life or property of someone you love.

o **Stay Alert** - Pay attention, keep the noise level low in your car and look for more than 1 emergency vehicle approaching when you hear a siren.

o **Investigate** - Check your rear-view mirror and both sides of your vehicle to estimate the speed of the emergency vehicle and plan your next move. Pull off the highway safely and gradually brake to avoid losing control.

**Enter** - Before re-entering the road, look in all directions, turn on your signal and gradually merge back into traffic looking for any other emergency vehicles.

#### Winter Safety tips

Please give the right of way to emergency response vehicles. When we are responding to an emergency in the JK area, we appreciate those that do give us the right of way. It cuts down on our response time and getting to the scene safely.

Keep anything that can burn **at least 3 feet** from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators, or space heaters. Chimney Fire season: Please make sure your chimneys are cleaned and inspected. **Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents every year.** *Rose Norris*

The building's new roof is now within reach and will be installed when weather conditions improve. Sharon Harris





## Juliaetta Elementary Painting Series

Scene #6—"The Castle" Once a Home, Now a Museum

Abram A. Adams came to the area in 1902. He constructed this home in 1905. It was called "The Castle" because of its likeness to a Scottish castle.

Abram Adams had served in the Civil War and was captured and imprisoned at Andersonville. He survived the camp and came west to settle and bring his family. Abram was a successful civil engineer, surveyor, contractor, builder, geologist, and horticulturist. He was one of Juliaetta's most colorful residents. The home he built was in the likeness of a Scottish Castle. The whole house was made of cement blocks that he formed to look like stones. He shipped in pressed metal ceilings for the nine rooms and installed central heating in the basement with heat ducts to each room. With the addition of an indoor bathroom, it was dubbed the most luxurious home in Juliaetta. Unfortunately, his wife fell ill in Minnesota and never saw the beautiful home. He lived in it with his surviving five children. Today, the home still stands and houses the museum for Juliaetta. Angie Cannon

The children did a wonderful job of decorating the tree this year. It is special to have children in the congregation who are actively involved.


We blew much-needed insulation into the ceiling of our church building this month. We are thankful to Early Bird Supply for their prompt service.

#### **Red-Tailed Hawks**

Of the large hawks, the Red-tailed hawk presents an identification challenge, because markings may vary from hawk to hawk. Consistent features are shape

and size. Red-tailed hawks belong to the hawk group known as buteos. These are big (only one North American hawk is larger) with broad rounded wings and a short tail. When seen from above, they typically are mostly brown with brick red tails. Size, from head to tail, is about 1.5' long. Wing-span is usually between 3 and 4 feet.



To complicate identification, female hawks are noticeably larger than their male counterparts. Also, Redtailed hawk coloration and markings vary from region to region.

Knowing enough generalities may be the best way to determine that a large hawk is a Red-tail. These hawks are birds of open country and are probably the most common raptors to be seen on a road trip. They may be soaring in large circles above open fields or perched on a telephone poles. From these vantage points, they watch for prey, usually small mammals such as rabbits, voles, rats, squirrels or even snakes. Redtailed hawks have superb eyesight: A hawk on the top of a 10-story building can spot a mouse on the ground. When a target is located, the hawk dives with feet outstretched and snatches its prey with 1.3" talons.

One of the easiest methods to identify this hawk is by its cry – a hoarse "SCREEE" lasting 2 or 3 seconds. Hollywood seems to think that this is the perfect cry for a predatory bird. Movie footage of all sorts of hawks and even eagles may be paired the sound of a Redtailed hawk.

Courting Red-tailed hawks soar in wide circles at a great height. The male then dives straight down and then turns and shoots straight up at nearly as steep an angle. After several repetitions, he will swoop down on the female from above, extends his feet and touch her back very gently. Sometimes the pair will clasp feet and plummet in spirals before parting.

The pairs share parenting duties. They cooperate in nest building – in a tree, on a cliff ledge, or on the top of a city building. They share incubation. When the young hatch, the male delivers food to the female who tears it into small pieces and feeds the little ones.

There are many prettier birds but few more magnificent than these hawks. *Nora Abbott* 

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
