Burn Permits

Burn permits will be required beginning May 1 for residents within Juliaetta city limits. These permits are free and can be obtained at City Hall or at cityofjuliaetta.com at least 24 hours before burning. The permits are reviewed by the Fire Chief and approved or denied. Also, please consider taking advantage of the brush bin at the Bulky Waste Site on the first and third Saturdays of each month, as an alternative to burning.

Applicants will work with Mayor Groseclose and City Maintenance, should be age 16+ and have a valid drivers license. 

Phil was part of the Kendrick Lions Club for several years and Donna taught EMT classes and made several "house" calls so that people didn't have to call an ambulance. Phil also helped Dave Jones start a grade school baseball team. One of Phil and Donna's favorite memories is helping organize the first JK sausage feed, auction, and "casino" night. This was held at the school cafeteria and gym. It was a huge success because the whole community became involved in its success.

Phil and Donna are also proud that Phil's Family Foods provided a local business where young people could learn good work ethics and the art of customer service.

Their oldest son was in business with them for 25 years. When Scott and Helen moved to Australia with their two sons, Aaron and Diane Heinen bought the business. Plant Corner

My early summer plant pick is the Lilac (Syringa). If you are looking for a hardy early blooming flowering shrub that grows great in our climate the Lilac just might be for you. Typically flowering around Mother's Day here in our area. I'm pretty sure you will find one to fit your needs. These fragrant flowering shrubs vary in size from smaller re-blooming varieties



like Miss Kim to mid size and full size shrubs up to more than twenty feet. They also come in a variety of colors from all different shades of purple, to pinks, white and even variegated flowers. Something for everyone. They are very hardy to cold and heat in our area. These plants are normally grown in USDA hardiness zones 4 through 8. Once established, these long lived shrubs are also very drought tolerant and made to stand the test of time in your yard and landscape. If you don't have one I suggest you find a variety that suits your needs and add it to your yard. *Rich Tackett*

Guardians of the KJ7 Cemeteries: Recognizing Those Who Preserve Our History This Memorial Day

Memorial Day is a time of remembrance, reflection, and reverence for those who have made the ultimate sacrifice in service to our nation. In the KJ7 area, this day holds special significance as we pay tribute to our fallen heroes and all who have departed from our lives, leaving a legacy that lives on in our memories and hearts.
